

Overview of the Department:

The Department of English was introduced since the inception of the college way back in 1964. Initially, classes were held at Lala H.S & M.P.School. Later on, the college had its own premises in its present location. During the years of pre-deficit phases, the department had no permanent teachers and classes were run by part-timers on a minimum honorarium /honorary basis purely in the interest of students who were mostly first generation of learners. The college came under deficit-grants-in-aid system in the year 1975 and then the UGC scale of pay was awarded to the teachers. The college came under Provincialisation Act in 2005 along with other colleges of the state.

Honours in the Department was opened in the late eighties. In spite of dearth of teachers efforts are always on to meet the demands of students and stake-holders in the best possible manner.

1. Dr Tanuj Kumar Dey, Associate Professor and Principal i/c as well has been working at this college since 1991. His area of interest is folklore. He obtained his Ph.D. degree from Assam University in 2016. His thesis was centred on the identity formation through oral narratives: a case study of the Koch-Rajbanshis of Barak Valley. He has a good number of research activities to his credit.. Dr. Dey has participated

in a number of Seminars and Workshops on National as well as International level held in different institutions and presented papers. He also contributes write-ups in the college magazine on a regular basis. He edited the inaugural issue of the research oriented book with an ISBN, Endeavour. He has also submitted a report to the UGC on his MRP on the Rajbanshi Community of Barak Valley and another one at College on The Assamese of Barak Valley. In 2011, he submitted the report of Minor Research Project to UGC, NERO, Guwahati on 'The Role of Folklore in Constructing Identity: A Study of the Koch-Rajbanshis in Southern Assam'. The study was postulated with the objectives of exploring the various expressive forms, both verbal and material, of the Rajbanshis of Barak Valley and how such self-reflective expressions help to form a distinct identity. The focus was on identification, documentation and description of folklore as an instrument which exhibited the persistent consciousness of the members of the community that they constitute and preserve a separate identity.

2. Dr. Manas Sinha, an Assistant Professor, has been working since 2007. His area of interset is comparative literature. He contributes regularly to journals and magazines. He served as the editor of *Endeavour*, an ISBN research based book

Adhunatan to which he contributed with poems in both Bengali and English. Dr. Manas Sinha obtained his Ph.D. degree from Assam University in 2015. The title of his thesis was "In the context of Irish Nationalism W.B. Yeats' poetry and its influence upon the poetry of Jibanananda Das". The research work was interdisciplinary in character reflecting inputs of both Bengali and English literatures. Before that he was awarded M.Phil degree in 2009. The research work was on Indian English literature, the title of which was "Indian ethos and values in Nissim Ezekiel's poetry". He has participated in various seminars, workshops and contributed with write-ups to research-based books and journals.

3. Ms Anamika Khersa has been serving as an Assistant Professor in the department since 2016. Her area of interest is North-East literature, Popular Culture.

Departmental activities:

Lala Rural College is a bi-faculty College (Arts and Commerce) and teachers of the Department have to take classes in both the Streams since students study English as a subject. The Department also offers Honours in addition to papers like Alternative English, Elective English and General English. With the introduction of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in the session 2018-2019, besides teaching general course, discipline specific course (DSC) the department teaches communicative course styled as AECC.

Honours students have been showing good results and passed students are working in Colleges, schools and other Government establishments. Special and additional classes for deserving students are another important activity of the Department. Students' assessment is done periodically through class tests and unit tests. Introduction of Smart Board in class rooms has made the class discussions focused, rewarding and interesting from students' stand point. In addition, the

Department conducts periodical Seminars; group Discussions on issues both academic and nonacademic. Resource persons from outside the college are also invited in significant seminars and important issues. In the academic session 2011-12, three Seminars were held at the initiative of the Department. One was organized with Political Science and History Department of the College, held at the Seminar Hall of the College on "The in Panchayat System: Issues of Women Challenges". It was held on 5th September 2011 where both students and teachers of the College actively participated, highlighting the role of women in rural perspectives and the change of scenario over the years. The second Seminar was held on 25th December, 2011 on "The Poems of Tagore and Social Reality". In was a purely academic exercise where participants highlighted various issues concerning the society and Tagore's writings which still inspires and acts as model on various challenges confronting the society even after 150 years of his appearance. The Seminar was chaired by Prof. R. S. Bhattacharjee of the Department. The third Seminar was held on 11th February 2012 on 'Cultural Turn of English Studies.' It was an important Seminar and since it touched some important issues on current Pedagogy of English Studies, two important members from outside the college were invited to make the work lively, interesting and focused. Dr. R.P.Biswas HOD of

the Dept. of English of Assam University and Mr. Santosh Rn Chakraborty, HOD, Dept. of English, Cachar College, Silchar were invited as resource persons since both of them take keen interest on the issues under discussion.

Flair has been the departmental journal for quite some time. It can be called the mouth-piece of the Department since the creative urge of the teachers and the taught of the Department is expressed through it. It is the outcome of the long felt requirement for such a platform which could inspire, encourage and create a habit, particularly students of advanced studies, to express their virgin thoughts that can make a great difference in the hours to come.

The Department of English is provided with a large number of books ranging from epic works of ancient Greek poets to the present development of cultural turn of English Studies. As such side by side of canonical works, the Department contains books of creative writers as well as books on Cultural Studies. In addition, collected reading materials from different sources make the library experiences a rewarding one. The Department has provision of lending books to students and faculty members of other Departments as well.

The Department is provided with a Computer with Broadband facilities that enable the faculty members of the Department to perform day to day activities. The advanced students in particular have been taking full advantage of internet since many of the materials prescribed in the Syllabi are not easily available.
